## **Ecclesiastes 3:1-14**

There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under the heavens:

- <sup>2</sup> a time to be born and a time to die,
  - a time to plant and a time to uproot,
- <sup>3</sup> a time to kill and a time to heal,
  - a time to tear down and a time to build,
- <sup>4</sup> a time to weep and a time to laugh,
  - a time to mourn and a time to dance,
- <sup>5</sup> a time to scatter stones and a time to gather them,
  - a time to embrace and a time to refrain from embracing,
- <sup>6</sup> a time to search and a time to give up,
  - a time to keep and a time to throw away,
- <sup>7</sup> a time to tear and a time to mend,
  - a time to be silent and a time to speak,
- <sup>8</sup> a time to love and a time to hate,
- a time for war and a time for peace.

<sup>9</sup> What do workers gain from their toil? <sup>10</sup> I have seen the burden God has laid on the human race. <sup>11</sup> He has made everything beautiful in its time. He has also set eternity in the human heart; yet no one can fathom what God has done from beginning to end. <sup>12</sup> I know that there is nothing better for people than to be happy and to do good while they live. <sup>13</sup> That each of them may eat and drink, and find satisfaction in all their toil—this is the gift of God. <sup>14</sup> I know that everything God does will endure forever; nothing can be added to it and nothing taken from it. God does it so that people will fear him.

## John 1:1-5,9-14

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. 2 He was with God in the beginning. 3 Through him all things were made; without him nothing was made that has been made. 4 In him was life, and that life was the light of all mankind. 5 The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it.

<sup>9</sup> The true light that gives light to everyone was coming into the world. <sup>10</sup> He was in the world, and though the world was made through him, the world did not recognize him. <sup>11</sup> He came to that which was his own, but his own did not receive him. <sup>12</sup> Yet to all who did receive him, to those who believed in his name, he gave the right to become children of God— <sup>13</sup> children born not of natural descent, nor of human decision or a husband's will, but born of God.

<sup>14</sup> The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us. We have seen his glory, the glory of the one and only Son, who came from the Father, full of grace and truth.
